# Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Webinar

### Course Description

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) affects many youth involved in Child Welfare. These are the children with the most disrupted placements; the ones who so often become “crossover kids”—involved with the justice system; and frequently end up homeless. They usually collect a variety of diagnoses but no treatment seems to work, even the most trauma-informed. This brief introduction to FASD will help you recognize this condition and learn some of the basics of successful intervention.

### Topics include:

- Prevalence, range, and presentation of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder
- Brief overview of brain development in FASD
- How FASD manifests in behavior, learning, relating and managing emotions
- Principles of Intervention: what works and what doesn't
- What is being done elsewhere to address FASD

Participants will be able to consider Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders in their understanding of challenging behaviors, and to strategize improved approaches.

*Kathryn Page* has worked in a variety of mental health, child welfare, juvenile justice, and educational settings over the years—all leading to her current focus on Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders. She is currently President of FASDNorCal, a parent-professional collaborative aiming to raise California's ability to diagnose, serve and prevent further generations affected by prenatal alcohol exposure. Previous positions include: Clinical Director of the FASD Diagnostic Clinic at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center; Disabilities Consultant for the Juvenile Drug Treatment Court; and Acting School Psychologist for the San Lorenzo Unified School District. Her Ph.D. is in clinical psychology; Internship at Stanford in addiction.
